#### **Executive Summary**

This is the second national report on the Seal of Biliteracy. The Seal of Biliteracy started in California in 2008 as a grassroots movement to reverse the deficit view of English Learners to instead honor and recognize them for their proficiency in English and another language while preparing all students for global citizenship. As of October 1, 2020, 40 states plus Washington, D.C. have established a state Seal of Biliteracy program. For the first time ever, all 50 states and the District of Columbia have or are working towards establishing a state Seal of Biliteracy.

Data on Seal of Biliteracy Programs were collected from 31 states (Arizona, Arkansas, California, Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Hawai'i, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington) from either the designee of the State Education Agency or the State Association for this report. Ten states (Alabama, Alaska, Kentucky, Montana, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Vermont, West Virginia, and Wyoming) are still working on establishing their state Seal of Biliteracy. Five states (Idaho, Maine, Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Tennessee) have no data available as they are in their first few years of implementation of their state Seal of Biliteracy. Four states (Colorado, Florida, Texas, and Wisconsin) and Washington D.C. did not participate in this report.

There were 108,199 students reported to have received the state Seal of Biliteracy in 2019, up from 91,433 in 2018.

The state with the most Seal of Biliteracy recipients was California, with 48,311 students. California also has the highest percentage of English Learners, Former English Learners, and Heritage Language Speakers combined (63%) who received the Seal of Biliteracy in 2018-19. North Carolina had the second highest number of students (9,584) who received the Seal of Biliteracy, and Virginia had the third highest number of students (7,046) who received the Seal of Biliteracy. The state of Washington awarded the Seal in the most languages—69 in total. Delaware was the only state participating in the report that had 100% of its counties with schools awarding the Seal. Twelve states awarded the Seal of Biliteracy in two or more world languages in addition to English.

Equity for English Learners is an important focus for the Seal of Biliteracy movement. At the time of the 2017-18 report, most states were not collecting data on their English Learners or Former English Learners. This year, however, 20 out of the 31 participating states reported data on English Learners who were awarded the Seal of Biliteracy. A total of 33,128 current and former English Learners were reported as earning the Seal in 2018-19. We project that the actual number of current and former English Learners who received the Seal would have been higher if all states had collected data on these students. This is a critical component of data collection to ensure equity in the awarding of the Seal of Biliteracy. States are encouraged to continue to expand this data collection to include more information about students who earn the Seal of Biliteracy, such as information on Former English Learners and Heritage Speakers of other languages. We hope that next year's report will include data on all students awarded the Seal of Biliteracy.

#### What is the Seal of Biliteracy?

The Seal of Biliteracy is an award given by a school, school district, or state in recognition of students who have studied and attained proficiency in two or more languages. For many states, one of the languages must be English. However, for some states, such as Hawai'i, students can earn the Seal in two or more languages other than English. Our vision is to help students recognize the value of their academic success and see the tangible benefits of being bilingual.

#### States with Approved Seal Programs

As of the publication of this document, all 50 states and the District of Columbia have or are working towards establishing a Seal of Biliteracy program. Forty states and the District of Columbia have approved state Seal of Biliteracy programs for their students (see Figure 1 below and Table 1 starting on page 10). Four states are in the process of developing a State Seal of Biliteracy program: Alabama, New Hampshire, Pennsylvania, and Vermont. Six states are in the early stages of developing a state Seal of Biliteracy program: Alaska, Kentucky, Montana, South Dakota, West Virginia, and Wyoming.





Figure 2 below illustrates the percentage of states at each level of implementation of a Seal of Biliteracy Program.

Figure 2. Percentage of States by Stage of Implementation




#### Participation in 2018-19 Data Collection

Data for the 2018-19 Seal programs were requested from State Education Departments and State Seal of Biliteracy Leaders, including members of the National Council of State Supervisors of Foreign Languages (NCSSFL) via an online form. Responses were accepted from July through October 2020. In early November, a draft of this report was sent to all State Education Agencies (SEA) for the opportunity to give feedback.

In order to be eligible to participate in this report, each state must have had an approved Seal of Biliteracy program available for implementation prior to the 2018-2019 school year. Of the 40 states plus the District of Columbia that offered Seal of Biliteracy programs in 2018-19, 61% collected data on the Seal and provided it for this report. For the states that did not have data to report, the primary reasons were:

- States in the early stages of Seal program development;
- States in which the Seal is under consideration;
- States with a Seal program that was adopted after the 2018-19 school year; and
- States that do not currently collect data on the Seal of Biliteracy.

Figure 3. Percentage of States by Participation in the 2018-19 Report



#### Levels of Language Proficiency Required

All but one state with approved Seal programs have designated a particular level of proficiency that students must demonstrate to earn the Seal of Biliteracy from the <u>ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines</u>. These guidelines are a description of what individuals can do with language in terms of interpretive, interpersonal, and presentational communication in real-world situations. For each skill, these guidelines identify five major levels of proficiency: Novice, Intermediate, Advanced, Superior, and Distinguished as depicted by the ACTFL Inverted Pyramid (Figure 4).





Figure 5 summarizes the percentage of states that offer a Seal of Biliteracy by the proficiency level required to earn the Seal. The majority of states (57%) use Intermediate Mid as evidence of the required proficiency for students to earn the Seal of Biliteracy. Just under one-third of states (32%) use the Intermediate High level of proficiency. Only a small percentage of states use Advanced Low (3%) or Intermediate Low (5%) for their Seals of Biliteracy.

Number of states using Intermediate High for their Seals: 13 (32.5%)



Other designations such as commendations or pathway awards, which are not officially Seals of Biliteracy, are not included.

#### Single and Multi-Level Seal Programs

As noted in Table 1, a number of states offer multiple levels of their Seals of Biliteracy (Delaware, Florida, Kansas, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, South Carolina, and Tennessee). The percentage of states with single level or multi-level Seal of Biliteracy programs are shown in Figure 6. In each case, states have designated different criteria and/or proficiency levels to earn the various levels of their Seals, as shown in Table 1.

Figure 6. Percentage of States with Single Level or Multi-Level Seal Programs







Figure 7. Number of Students that were Awarded the Seal





Figure 11. States that Awarded the Seal in Various Languages by Percentage (50% or more of the states)




Figure 12. States that Awarded the Seal in Various Languages by Percentage (49% to 20% of the states)





Figure 13. States that Awarded the Seal in Various Languages by Percentage (19% to 10% of the states)



Figure 14. Map of Number of Students Awarded the Seal in English and Two World Languages by State




Figure 15. Map of Number of Students Awarded the Seal in English and Three World Languages by State




Figure 17. Map of Percentage of Schools that Awarded the Seal by State




Figure 20. Map of Current and Former English Learners Awarded the Seal by State


